IN A RECENT MEETING THAT I PARTICIPATED IN, THERE WAS SIGNIFICANT DISCUSSION AROUND THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN "CREATIVITY" AND "INNOVATION." JACLYN MILES IS A VERY MODEST WOMAN, DESPITE THE FACT THAT SHE WAS RECENTLY HONOURED WITH A WOMEN OF EXCELLENCE AWARD BY THE YMCA AND HAS BEEN MISS CANADA FOR THE PAST YEAR. IN FACT, SHE WOULD NEVER HAVE CONSIDERED RUNNING FOR MISS CANADA HAD HER CLOSE FRIENDS NOT URGED HER TO DO SO AND SECRETLY NOMINATED HER (SHE THINKS)!

Even after her name was put forward to the Committee, Jaclyn needed persuading. At a younger age Jaclyn competed in a beauty pageant, feeling at that time that she was validated by the way she looked. Brescia and her feminist-based courses made her realize that, instead, she should be valued for the qualities that she will have her whole life: intelligence; integrity; and compassion. She says, “When the

Miss Canada group assured me that this was not a beauty pageant, I began to do some research. I learned that the event was more about the principles that each competitor stood for than about looks or talent.”

In Montreal, Jaclyn was in “competition” with 1,600 other young women.

Maybe it was because she didn’t see it as a competition so much as a chance to tell her story, that she was chosen as the overall winner. In the final round, 20 women were asked a question. Jaclyn’s was, “What is the most important issue facing Canada today?” Her answer was simple: abuse. She qualifies this, “The solution to abuse is, of course, not at all simple. More than

anything, I want to convey to others that we must all show empathy when we hear about cases of abuse and be careful not to judge. Abuse does happen and, when you are in an abusive situation, getting out of it is not as easy as it seems. People should not be thinking, ‘What’s wrong with her that she let herself be abused?’ Rather we should be asking, ‘What’s wrong with the perpetrator?’” Jaclyn also knows that women’s self-esteem can be greatly diminished if they have been in an abusive relationship.

WHEN SHE SPEAKS PUBLICLY ABOUT THE ISSUE, WHICH SHE HAS DONE FREQUENTLY THIS YEAR AS MISS CANADA, SHE TRIES TO TELL YOUNG WOMEN, AND MEN, THAT WHAT MATTERS MOST ARE THE CHOICES WE MAKE AND OUR RESOLVE TO BECOME A BETTER, STRONGER PERSON.”

Jaclyn spent two wonderful years studying at Brescia, working towards a combined honours degree in French and Family Studies but had to interrupt her studies here when her brother was in a serious accident. Since then he has recovered and is able to walk again, despite a grim prognosis. Jaclyn finished her degree in her hometown at the University of Windsor and went on to complete her education degree at Althouse. But it was Brescia, she says, that won her heart.

What is next for Miss Canada? She says, “Following a summer in Guyana working on a national action plan, I realized that I want to help women in Canada or abroad.” In the meantime, it is clear that Jaclyn will continue to help those around her feel better about the situations they are in, and about themselves.

Finding a sense of community a world away

LAUGHTER IS UNIVERSAL AND SO IT SEEMS IS SOCCER. DEEP IN THE DENSE RAINFOREST OF BRAZIL IN THE STATE OF AMAZONAS, ACROSS THE RIO NEGRO, YOU WILL FIND A SMALL VILLAGE POPULATED BY OVER A HUNDRED INDIGENOUS PEOPLE CALLED THE DÂW. AMONG OTHER UNIVERSITY STUDENTS, TASHA NICOLE LECHOWICZ – A NUTRITION AND FAMILY STUDIES STUDENT AT BRESCIA – WAS GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY BY GLOBAL YOUTH VOLUNTEER NETWORK TO HELP AN ORPHANAGE AND THE DÂW COMMUNITY IN BRAZIL.

“First contact,” as Tasha puts it, was in the Amazonas where her team worked at an orphanage. Here they were encouraged to play with the children. Raquel (the guide) instructed the volunteer

how much the Dâw children loved to play, saying, “They are all so unbelievably full of energy. They never wanted to stop playing volleyball, soccer, and cards.” It was not all play with the Dâw

and bodies in the Rio Negro. They slept in huts with hammocks. As volunteers, it was the first time I had to dig my own “bathroom,” which was a hole in the ground.

team to organize soccer games and excursions to the beach. Raquel stated how important it was to just have fun and “love the children.”

The volunteers’ other duties involved cleaning and clearing rooms to make space for new children, in addition to help empty food trucks when they arrived.

The second point of contact was on a plot of land called Warua on which the Dâw people live. Community and family are central to the Dâw lifestyle, so it is very important for them to spend time together. Thus, they enjoyed spending time getting to know the volunteer team. Tasha observed

villagers though. Tasha also taught English to the students, who, even though they knew very little, were happy to try.

In celebration of the volunteers, the Dâw asked members from the community to present speeches and perform an Acai ceremony and dance. The leader of the Dâw, Francisco, and his wife, Dora, shared personal stories and, having spent so much time with the volunteers, moved everyone to tears with their speech. Dora explained to Tasha why the Dâw live the way they do. Tasha relates, “Our guide Diego said that living simply was the way of life for the Dâw. They washed their clothes

International Innovation Hard at Work

PANIT GILL ('11) REMEMBERS THE EXACT MOMENT INSPIRATION STRUCK HER AND MOTIVATED HER TO DEVELOP, PLAN, AND FUNDRAISE FOR A PROGRAM TO HELP CHANGE THE LIVES OF WOMEN IN INDIA. DURING A KEYNOTE AT BRESCIA'S 2009 FLAIR STUDENT LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE, THE SPEAKER SHARED A STORY ABOUT A CHILD IN ANOTHER COUNTRY HAVING JUST ONE TEA BISCUIT A DAY TO EAT. "NO ONE SHOULD HAVE TO GO TO BED HUNGRY," SAYS PANIT.

"I THOUGHT IF I COULD JUST MAKE THAT CHANGE IN ONE PERSON'S LIFE IT WOULD BE WORTH IT. THE IDEA FOR MY WORKSHOPS CAME RIGHT THEN, DURING THAT SPEECH. I WANTED TO BE BOLD AND TO BE A LEADER PROMOTING CHANGE IN THE WORLD. BRESCIA TAUGHT ME THAT," SHE SAYS.

Her dream – to bring a five-week sewing workshop to women and girls in India – was realized when she and her mother, Karamjit, travelled to Chandigarh in November 2011, after planning and raising funds from friends, family, and members of their Brampton, Ontario community.

"We asked people to sponsor a girl to attend the workshop. For just \$100 a girl was able to get the workshop experience, and the sewing kit went home with her at the end," explains Panit. The funds raised also allowed them to hire local professionals and to provide all of the sewing materials to the participants free of charge.

The aim of the workshop is to provide new skills, educate women, and give them a means to support their families financially. Thanks to word-of-mouth promotion, more than 60 women from area villages applied for the inaugural workshop. Of those, 30 women between the ages of 14 and 65 were chosen based on their incomes and an interview and selection process.

"It's so amazing to see women so keen and eager to learn. Although our rule is to not take anyone younger than 16 because they should be at school, we did discover a few weeks in that one of the girls was only in Grade 7. She had lied and said she was 16 because her parents couldn't afford for her to go to school and she wanted to learn. It was heartbreaking to see a girl who wanted to learn so badly be unable to go to school because of a lack of money."

Now, Panit and Karamjit are hoping to bring the workshops to a different area of India every two years, beginning in November 2013. "I'm so grateful to my mom for supporting me every step of the way in this," says Panit. "It was my plan but I could not have done it without her. She's someone I look up to as a leader and she inspires me to work toward my goals."

After completing her preliminary year through CultureWorks, an English for Academic Purposes School, Meng decided to stay at Brescia not only to explore the university lifestyle in Canada, but also to be a BOLD student in the Division of Food and Nutritional Sciences. "Studying at Brescia is one of the most exciting and rewarding experiences in my life," Meng says. She also has fond memories of faculty and staff who guided her throughout her university studies at Brescia.

Coming from overseas can be a challenging experience for many students in the world, but at Brescia Meng found the support needed to facilitate the transition to her new life as a student in Canada.

As an international student, Meng was always encouraged to express her thoughts and opinions, and build strong relationships with other students and the community. "Brescia's leadership has helped me not only in my personal life, but also professionally," she adds.

After graduating in 2011 from the Division of Food and Nutritional Sciences program, this brave young alumna continued her studies at the University of Hong Kong, where she received a Master's degree in Application of Good Manufacturing Practice (GMP) in Hong Kong-style restaurants. Today, Meng is working at Lee Kum Kee International Holdings as a food technologist, in the Research and Development Department.

The most challenging part of Meng's job is that it requires professional experience to develop a new product. But, with the knowledge in Food Science that she acquired at Brescia, Meng has been able to succeed, and add value to everything she does at Lee Kum Kee. "Brescia's leadership helped me to obtain my current job. During the group interview, I led the discussion, and I was not afraid to speak in front of people even in Cantonese, which I am not completely familiar with. I will always be proud of being a Brescia alumna," she adds.

FOR NEARLY FOUR DECADES, MARTHA DUTRILLAC HAS BEEN HONOURING BOTH THE LONDON AND HURON-PERTH CATHOLIC DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARDS WITH HER POSITIVE ENERGY, PASSION FOR LEARNING, AND COMMITMENT TO PRACTISING AND TEACHING EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP. SHE ALWAYS DREAMED OF BEING A TEACHER, AND IN RETROSPECT FEELS GRATEFUL FOR HAVING SUCH A "BLESSED AND RICH CAREER."

Martha graduated from Brescia in 1969 before moving on to Teachers' College. She has fond memories of her time at Brescia, recalling the positive influence and guidance that her fellowship with the Ursuline Sisters provided. In particular, she admired Sister Corona for her confident individualism, energy, and strong female leadership. Martha also developed tremendous friendships at Brescia, some of which are still strong to this day. Ironically Martha's office at the Huron-Perth Catholic District School Board in Dublin, Ontario was once an Ursuline School. Martha says, "My colleagues and I often talk about the history in the building and I always thought that I had come full-circle to end up working somewhere supported by the same group of women who taught me at university."

For 20 years Martha worked in eight different schools throughout the London area before moving to the Huron-Perth Board. Her career progressed from teaching, to becoming a principal, followed by superintendent, and then director, where she has spent the last four years as Director of Education. Regarding her successful career, Martha humbly says, "It's important to recognize that many people have been integral to my journey. I wouldn't be where I am today in the context of the Catholic District School Boards without the support of my family and network of colleagues."

Martha surrounded herself with strong leaders throughout her career, which she believes has

helped her to understand leadership in her own life. She considers an effective leader to be a visionary, who is nurturing, compassionate, and confident in his/her approach to working with people. They need to understand leadership as a process and be willing to work to build the team that is required to achieve outcomes. She adds, "Leadership is no longer about one person at the top with all the knowledge. We all come together and learn from each other."

If I didn't have my network of peers to support and grow my leadership, I wouldn't have achieved nearly as much success." What have you been doing since graduation?

After graduating from Brescia, I earned an internship with ARAMARK in Food Service Management and worked there until 2000, when we moved to Sarnia. There I was hired as a Clinical Dietitian at Vision Nursing and Rest Home. In 2006 I decided to return to school to obtain my Master's of Business in Health Care Management from Baker College in the United States, which combined with my LTC Administrator's certification through the Ontario Association of Non-profit Homes for Services and Seniors in 2012, allowed me to change roles at work and become the Assistant Administrator.

Although I have limited clinical practice responsibility in the home now, I feel better knowing that, in my administrative role, I can ensure that residents receive high-quality food and service now and into the future. After having worked in other homes, I know that Vision will be where I retire. I feel at home there.

What motivates you in your work?

I think what I enjoy the most is the ability to implement change and monitor the positive effects these changes can have on the residents of the nursing home. I have an opportunity to build relationships, which does not always exist in other jobs. My team has a clear focus to stay in front of industry changes and we work to continually move forward and embrace new technologies and ideas. All of these things keep my work engaging.

Why did you decide to get involved with Brescia as an alumna?

Teachers and role models like Dr. Alicia Garcia, Chair of the Division of Food and Nutritional Sciences, always knew my name and I felt that faculty were always there for me. As a preceptor for students who are completing their

internships, I'm more of a guide because the students who come out of Brescia are very independent and the quality of their work is second to none. By the time they get to me, they have the necessary knowledge and skills; I just help apply these into their practice. If you have an opportunity to give back to Brescia, whether it be supervising an internship or simply attending an event, I would encourage you as an alumna to do so.

What advice can you give to future alumnae hoping to enter the industry?

You have to treat everyone with respect, no matter what their position is. Every job is important, and each person on my team plays a role in the quality of care we provide. I will do laundry, or make beds with the housekeepers if we're busy. In terms of leadership, it is important to be fair and open, and not to ask anyone to do something that you wouldn't be willing to do yourself. Networking is also crucial. Find a group, whether local or part of a national network, and participate. Continue to challenge yourself. When you've accomplished something, acknowledge it and ask, "How can it be done better?"

Impacting healthy eating for students of all ages

DR. PAULA (NESBITT) DWORATZEK ('89), ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR IN THE DIVISION OF FOOD AND NUTRITIONAL SCIENCES, HAS BEEN TEACHING AT BRESCIA SINCE 2007. DR. DWORATZEK IS AN ALUMNA WHO HAS MADE THE CHOICE TO LEAD NOT ONLY THROUGH HER INNOVATIVE RESEARCH, BUT ALSO THROUGH THE IMPACT THAT SHE HAS HAD ON HER STUDENTS AND THE COMMUNITY AS A WHOLE.



Surely we can all recall a time when we grabbed a bite to eat from a restaurant or cafeteria without thinking twice about the nutritional value. Dr. Dworatzek, Dr. June Matthews ('00), and their students have worked closely with Hospitality Services at Western and Brescia to launch the Food Resources and Education for Student Health (FRESH) Program to help

students make healthy food choices. FRESH not only bolsters knowledge about what we eat, but was also designed to improve the food environment. Dr. Dworatzek explains, "Undergraduate nutrition students benefit from gaining practical experience in peer nutrition education, and graduate students help design and implement the program. On menus throughout campus, a FRESH symbol is placed beside healthy food options, changing the food environment for those eating on campus."

The food environment also plays a critical role at the elementary school level. Dr. Dworatzek's latest project, Let's Understand Nutrition and Children's Health in Elementary School (LUNCHES), received a research grant of \$120,000 over two years from the Canadian Institute of Health Research. The study was created after Dr. Dworatzek received a newsletter, from her children's elementary school, describing a change to balanced-day schooling. The grass roots policy was implemented on a school-by-school basis and includes a new schedule

re-worked from a traditional school day to include three blocks of teaching and two 40-to-50 minute blocks of nutrition and physical activity. The balanced-day also has two 20-minute eating periods versus one in the traditional school schedule.

There are over 1,000 schools in Ontario that have implemented the balanced-school schedule, with very little scientific literature on the topic. Dr. Dworatzek and her research colleagues who include Lesley Macaskill ('93), a lecturer and former public health nutritionist; Dr. Marina Salvadori, a pediatrician and Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry professor; and statistician Dr. Jamie Seabrooke, wanted to assess whether or not the packed lunch contents and nutritional intake is different in the balanced school day versus the traditional school day. "There is an opportunity for increased healthy eating, depending on what's in those packed lunches. Children have more time to eat, but if they are eating packaged foods instead of fruits and vegetables, it probably won't be healthier," she says. "We are not trying to say that one is better than the other, but rather assess the differences in the two schedules. Perhaps this will help parents when they are packing their children's lunches."

A Perfect Fit

Before following her heart by opening her own firm, Liz valued the opportunity to work for firms that had a significant number of female partners who "always had an equal voice at the partnership table."

While building her professional presence in London, Liz was approached by a Brescia Council of Trustee member regarding an opportunity to join the Council. Since starting her volunteer history with Brescia, Liz has found many aspects of her role to be rewarding. In particular, she has enjoyed "watching the evolution of Brescia Bold." The momentum that the campaign has built is exciting, and Liz "cannot wait to see where it will lead."

Similar to strong campaigns such as Bold, strong leaders often have people to guide them in the right direction. Liz has had her fair share of leaders to follow throughout her career, offering advice, support, and friendship both personally and professionally. When asked what advice she has to pass along to Brescia students and alumnae who want to lead boldly, Liz replies,

"BE FEARLESS AND TAKE CHANCES. LEADERS ARE VISIONARIES, AND YOU CANNOT BE A VISIONARY IF YOU DO NOT BELIEVE IN YOURSELF AND THE THINGS YOU SET OUT TO ACHIEVE."

Liz showed true leadership last December when she graciously announced her gift of \$75,000 to Brescia in honour of her parents, who have instilled in her the value of hard work, community service, and social justice. The Howard and Lois Hewitt Scholarship will span a 10-year period, providing one upper-year student each year with \$6,000 in recognition of the recipient's demonstrated leadership and initiative as evidenced by her involvement in co-curricular activities, volunteerism, social justice, family responsibility, or community service. The additional \$15,000 will go to The Circle Women's Centre at Brescia.

Liz's advice certainly seems to be working for her so far. Among her colleagues, the London community, fellow Brescia volunteers, and donors, Liz continues leading others to create positive change at Brescia and the community. Like Brescia's Bold students and the Bold campaign, Liz's leadership qualities have the potential to take her anywhere. Fortunately for now, her volunteer position at Brescia seems to be a perfect fit.

Noha graduated from Brescia in 2011 with a double major in Family Studies and Community Development and completed her community development placement with Brescia at Chelsey Park Retirement Community, where she is now the volunteer and marketing co-ordinator. Brescia taught me the meaning of female empowerment and I have cherished that. I have two beautiful children who are benefitting from what I learned there."

According to Noha, one of Brescia's strengths is helping students balance academic excellence and social involvement. With smaller classes, she felt more comfortable and engaged in her learning. She had the opportunity to develop a strong rapport with her professors and felt invested in her learning experience. When it came to the social aspect of university life, Noha was active in

the Brescia University College Students' Council (BUCSC) and being a Soph, dedicating herself to welcoming first-year students, and offering them guidance and support. Noha's involvement with Brescia didn't stop after graduation. SISTER JANE FRANCES HAS BEEN A VERY FAMILIAR PRESENCE AROUND BRESCIA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE. DURING HER 70 YEARS AS A MEMBER OF THE URSULINE COMMUNITY, SISTER JANE RESPONDED GENEROUSLY TO THE MANY CALLS FOR SERVICE. SHE LIVED AT “THE PINES” IN CHATHAM, GLENGARDA IN WINDSOR, ST. IGNACE AND STEPHENSON, MICHIGAN, WALLACEBURG, ONTARIO, AND ROCKYFORD, ALBERTA. IN SEPTEMBER 1990, SISTER JANE MADE BRESCIA HER HOME.

During the years prior to her arrival at Brescia, Sister Jane was the assistant to the Superior of “The Pines” and was involved in the many demands of running a large community of Sisters and girls in the boarding school. She was a great visitor to the local hospitals, taught religious education classes, did pastoral visiting for those who needed companionship, took care of children with special needs and was known for her kindness to everyone.

When Sister Jane arrived at Brescia she recalled that there were 23 Sisters there at that time and it was a busy community. Before long, Sister Jane found herself visiting and bringing communion to the sick at St. Joseph’s Hospital. There were many meetings involved in this work and that was not her favourite part, she says with a smile!

Sister Jane was the community infirmarian for several years and is remembered for her compassion and thoughtfulness. She was also responsible for booking the Chapel and Rose Room for meetings, gatherings, and celebrations.

Sister Jane took an interest in all things “Brescia.” She was a great support to the staff, students, and faculty. In her own quiet way she made friends, showed compassion, and offered prayers for the many people who crossed her path. She found great joy in preparing the chapel for all the special feasts and events that took place at Brescia. The Brescia chaplains could always depend on Sister Jane’s generous and constant attention to their needs.

Sister Jane provided a great service to Brescia in her own right. She also worked with two other Ursuline Sisters: Sister Marina Stock, who served as Brescia’s registrar and Sister Audrey Stock, who was the community nurse. Sister Jane moved to Villa Angela on December 28, 2010 and is always happy to see her Brescia friends.

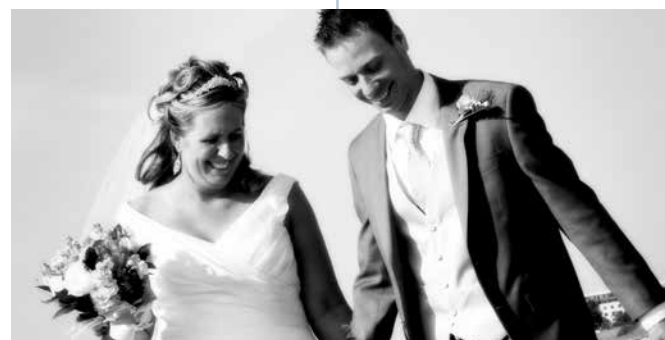
